- marae are safe and healthy, contributing to the well-being of iwi, hapū and whānau
- people are engaged on the marae and an increasing number of events and activities are held to ensure the transmission of mātauranga Māori
- marae increasingly contribute to the revitalisation of te reo and tikanga Māori

Three Stages of Oranga Marae

Application(s)

- 1 Marae Plan development
- 2 Technical Reports
- 3 Implementation

Marae Development Plan a marae development plan is needed for all Oranga Marae investment.

The marae needs to create a Marae Development Plan (MDP) to set out its development goals and the amount of investment it needs.

This plan outlines the vision of the marae, current state and proposed actions. The marae controls this process and the Oranga Marae Committee mainly wants to see that the whānau or hapū have worked together to plan for the sustainable future of their marae and that they will support the plan to make it happen. The MDP component of the programme will remain open all year. This means that marae can apply for MDP funding when best suits them. **Cultural revitalisation activities** – a marae may apply for financial or other support for activities in the MDP to help revitalise Māori culture on the marae. Requests for funding may be made at any time after the Plan has been approved. There is no template for an MDP but it must include these things:

- 1.1. Vision
- 1.2. Cultural aspirations
- 1.3. Physical aspirations
- 1.4. Assessment of current state and opportunities
- 1.5. Action plan (time, resources, outcomes, priorities, maintenance)
- 1.6. Plan must be endorsed by the wider whānau and Trustees

Stage Two

Technical and Feasibility Support for some capital (building) works, a marae may need to do a technical or feasibility study to show that the planned work is practical. Similarly, a resource or building consent may be required or a marae may need assistance in determining appropriate cultural development activities. If needed, an advisor can help the marae to apply for appropriate funding. Examples of what marae can seek financial support for include:

- a. specialist advisor and or author
- b. environmental assessment, conservation, archaeological and heritage reviews
- c. design costs such as concept drawings or architectural design plans
- d. consent and approvals such as heritage authorisation, resource consent, building consent
- e. maintenance plan
- f. conservation report
- g. current condition report of place, structure, property or taonga.
- h. seismic strengthening reports and structural engineering reports
- i. fire reports
- j. property valuations reports
- k. geological assessments or geotechnical reports.

Stage Three

Marae Development Implementation an advisor may help a marae to apply for funding or other support for the capital works identified in the Marae Development Plan. Marae are able to seek funding from other sources to assist in this as well as from Oranga Marae. There is no minimum requirement for funding from other sources. Oranga Marae is a contestable fund with finite limits so there are no guarantees that all applications will be fully funded. Marae are expected to use their own and other resources to assist in implementing their plan.

What Can Be Funded

- New marae facilities
- wharenui, wharekai, wharepaku, tangata whenua or manuhiri shelters, whare waka, car parking (within the marae reservation land) and fencing
- Conservation and preservation of marae taonga
- Redevelopment and extensions
- Repairs
- Making a facility fully functional and fit for purpose
- Professional fees
- Project management costs
- Purchase of buildings
- Cultural activities

What Can Not Be Funded

- Kura or Wānanga Marae
- Whānau marae on whānau land
- Retrospective applications
- Operating expenses
- Roothing
- Purchase of land/ land ownership
- Papakāinga
- Debt repayment
- Loans, deposits or underwriting projects
- Individual, commercial, political and religious objectives
- Fundraisers
- Redistribution of Funds
- Alcohol and Drugs
- Medical Expenses or health equipment
- Capital Investment

Fund

Lottery Community fund

For

- Ongoing operating costs for existing or expanded services and activities
- Projects beyond an organisation's day-to-day operations
- Helping to top-up an organisation's existing funding
- Minor capital works projects valued at \$50,000 or less (i.e. cannot be a \$50k contribution to a \$70k project).

Waikato Fund priorities

• Enabling our communities to be resiliently engaged and connected with the consideration for youth, elderly, Māori, rural and ethnic groups.

• Access to Mātauranga Māori is supported.

Lower priority is given to:

- Organisations who do not demonstrate a wider community benefit;
- Organisations who have significant uncommitted reserves.

Tip/Examples

- Can apply for up to \$10,000 without a legal entity status
- Wānanga costs to enable transmission of mātauranga
- Wharenui, Wharekai refurbishment i.e. utensils, equipment, mattresses etc

Community Organisation Grant Scheme (COGS)

- The running or operational costs of organisations that provide community-based social services
- Community development costs, such as hui, training, planning, evaluation and facilitator fees
- Community projects or event costs that:
 - encourage participation in communities
 - promote community leadership
 - promote social, economic and cultural equity.
